When God Comes, There is Hope for Me.

For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope. Romans 15:4

Therefore, with minds that are alert and fully sober, set your hope on the grace to be brought to you when Jesus Christ is revealed at His coming. 1 Peter 1:10-13

When God Comes, Suffering is Not Meaningless.

So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. 2 Corinthians 4:16-17

I love the Christmas season. It brings me great joy. I love Christmas lights, Christmas trees, Christmas carols, time with family, gifts, and even a little snow. But for the past few years, Christmas has been hard. My husband, Tim, lost a battle with cancer a few years ago, and Christmas is one of those times when his absence is very apparent. Sometimes it is just hard to be joyful.

The sadness that I feel reminds me that we live in a broken world. A world that is not how God intended it to be. A world in which many people are experiencing suffering and pain. Perhaps that suffering is from the loss of a job and difficulty putting food on the table. Or a broken relationship. Or physical pain or illness. Or loneliness and isolation. Or the loss of a loved one. And it all seems so meaningless. Why would God allow this suffering to happen? What good can possibly come from it?

During Tim's illness, I found myself asking God those questions pretty frequently. This was not our plan. We were going to grow old together and travel the world. I hated seeing him suffer. I hated the thought of being alone. So, I prayed for a miracle. That would certainly be a great story to tell, and an opportunity to witness to His glory. That would give our suffering meaning. But that was not God's will.

Instead, God used the time of Tim's illness in ways we could never have imagined. I cannot begin to describe the incredible witness to his faith that Tim demonstrated during that journey. He felt called to share the message of God's grace with anyone who would listen, and at times he shared it with those who didn't really want to hear it. He even wrote a book about his faith.

God worked through that time to strengthen our faith and trust in Him. He gave us a peace that was totally unexplainable. He used our lives to touch many people. He showed us how we are a part of something bigger, and he showed us the very best in people. We were surrounded with love and support in ways that we had never experienced before. I would never say that I am glad we had to go through that time.

Suffering is never good from our human perspective and is hard to understand. But I can tell you what we discovered. If you are looking for Him, God will reveal Himself, even in the midst of your suffering. And I know “that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose” (Romans 8:28) and that our suffering did have meaning.

Dear God, help me remember that You sent Your one and only Son to earth because You love me and want me to spend eternity with You, and “that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us” because of Jesus. Romans 8:18

When God Comes, Prayers Get Answered.

But the angel said to him: “Do not be afraid, Zechariah; your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you are to call him John. He will be a joy and delight to you, and many will rejoice because of his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord.” Luke 1:13-14

Our youngest daughter Ivy has Down syndrome. This was an unexpected diagnosis at her birth. To say that our family’s prayer life has changed or increased since her arrival would be a massive understatement. When you are handed something in life completely unexpected, or something you know nothing about, it feels at times all you have is prayer.

There are numerous stories I could share with you about my prayers for Ivy and God just “showing up.” Back in the spring of 2020, shortly after the pandemic started Ivy was a tad ill; she wasn’t eating much and was just being difficult. This didn’t really alarm us: she had just turned two! But one day she was crying and Jason said, “wow, her tonsils are **huge!**” For the next few months we did virtual visits with doctors trying to get her an appointment to get her tonsils removed during the pandemic.

Finally we got a date. Prior to surgery, I asked a nurse if they could take a look at her ear tubes while he was in there. I reminded a different nurse on the day of the surgery. When the surgeon came in, I asked again and he said, “Sure, no problem.”

The doctor came out and said the removal of her tonsils went just fine, but then he asked if we had any concerns about her hearing. Jason and I replied, “Not at all. She is chatting up a storm talking about everything. If you ask her to take something to her room she’ll do it.” He asked if we recalled her having an ear infection recently. Again, no.

The doctor said that when he looked at her ear tubes, he found an old infection that never drained out. He removed it, but the infection caused holes inside her ear drums, and then he started talking about hearing aids, and her possibly having one implanted when she gets older.

That’s when I remember my brain feeling like it was swirling outside of my head. I interrupted him and said, “Do you think this is permanent damage?” He said it was highly likely it was.

I couldn’t believe him, and I kinda think I **wouldn’t** believe him. She was talking so much, and so responsive. We came in for a tonsillectomy and now you’re telling me my little girl has severe permanent hearing loss due to an old infection we didn’t catch? The range of emotions was too much: guilt that we didn’t catch the ear infection that caused this, and sadness and frustration that we had another hurdle to navigate.

The doctor said we will do a follow up exam and hearing test in six weeks to see if there is any improvement. He repeated that it would be highly unlikely given the size of the hole it would close, but sometimes it happens.

We prayed for little Ivy’s ears just about everyday, sometimes multiple

times a day. I said, "Lord, I know You are bigger than those holes in her ears. The doctor has his science and his experience, but I have You! The doctor said there's no way, but I believe You make ways!" We prayed for the Lord to heal her ears, for His will to be done, and for it all to be to the glory of His name, that all may see and know God did this!

Six weeks later, Ivy and I went to her checkup. The doctor looked in her left ear and exclaimed, "Wow!" Miraculously, the hole had completely closed! I still remember the sense of peace and confidence in the Lord I felt in that moment. I was thinking, "Well, of course it did. That is who God is!" I told the doctor we had been praying for those ears for six weeks straight, so I wasn't surprised one bit!

Now, the right ear still has a hole in it, and I wondered why God only healed one ear? Did I not pray enough or hard enough? I told a friend who gently reminded me, "Nicole, the left ear is the miracle!"

I asked the surgeon on the day of Ivy's tonsil removal why no other doctors had found this. He said it was too far in and could have only been seen through surgery. I believe the Lord put it on my heart to mention her ears to show us something we didn't even know to look for. A miracle inside of another miracle!

We have a God who loves us, hears us and truly wants good for our lives. He wants us to see and experience miraculous moments. In the Christmas story, God answered Zechariah and Elizabeth's prayers for a son when they were well beyond normal childbearing years.

When the mess you're in seems too big, when "there's no fixing this one," God is there waiting to show you one of those little "left ear" miracles! Pour out your heart and ask Him to miraculously close up a hole that needs fixing in your life. It may not happen when you want it to: Zechariah and Elizabeth waited a long time. Sometimes life is truly challenging, and you're stuck on a "right ear problem" that just won't close. That's OK. Keep praying, keep believing, and keep trusting that God will come through for you just like he has for Ivy, and if you ask her what God's done in her life, you might just get a, "Yay, God!" in response. Just make sure you whisper it in her left ear...for now!

When God Comes, He Makes Us Uncomfortable.

*“Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the
meek, for they will inherit the earth.” Matthew 5:3-5*

The family going through this debacle ponders whether what has transpired is bad or not, but instead land on the fact that it's just **inconvenient and uncomfortable**. Jesus allows for us, and sometimes makes us uncomfortable. One of the final lyrics of this song gets to the Christmas story:

*A young girl expects a child she can't explain,
Forced to walk a hundred miles just to give birth in the hay.
While the king at that same hour, fearing challenge to his power,
Sent his troops to track them down and wipe them out. Yep, hands down.*

Is it good or bad? It's inconvenient and uncomfortable, and that's where the Holy Spirit loves to work! The Bible verse mentions the “poor in spirit,” “those who mourn and “the meek.” Those sure don't sound like comfortable places, but it's where God promises to be and present to us some incredible gifts! This holiday season, it can be easy at times to label time with family, restrictions on events, and unforeseen circumstances “good” or “bad.”

Consider a new label in the hard times: **inconvenient**. God has done amazing things on inconvenient, uncomfortable Christmases.

Dear God, You came as a King in a manger and gave us a gift with hands and feet we can't afford. God, though there will be inconvenient and uncomfortable times during this Christmas season, help us remember the most inconvenient Christmas of all time while keeping in mind what you are able to do with inconvenience and discomfort. Give us your eyes to provide comfort to others this season who need it as we await your Son's second coming!

But very truly I tell you, it is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him to you. As my husband and I sat in the waiting room and the surgery was about to begin, a friend sent us a song, "Trust in You," by Lauren Daigle. We both listened with tears, lots of tears. We realized that the Holy Spirit had shown up to speak truth to us and to carry us through this scary day.

Whenever doubts flooded our thinking in the coming months, my husband and I would play the song. It was the perfect reminder to trust in the Lord no matter the circumstance.

My son was thankful, too. God showed up to guide us all.

Just so you know, he did propose in front of the altar at church four days after surgery. It was the perfect way to begin their life together with the Holy Spirit, the helper in the midst of the moment. God is always at work, giving us the help we need to get through whatever our next steps are.

Dear Holy Spirit, I am so thankful for your guidance and help that is so desperately needed. Help me to seek the support you provide during difficult times, see the hope in the birth of my Savior, and to empower me to bring others to know our Father.

When God Comes, The Unlikely Are Chosen.

Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before him. 1 Corinthians 1:26-29

When I was in elementary school we would play kickball at recess. Somehow, two team captains were chosen, and then they took turns picking people for their team. They would pick their friends, and then the most athletic kids, etc. I was usually one of the last to be chosen because I wasn't very good at it.

I always hated being one of the last to be picked. Even now I experience times when I feel rejection, times when I don't feel valuable, times when I feel that I am just not good enough.

I would guess that you have felt that way too, but I am reminded in Scripture that even if that is how I feel about myself, that is not how God sees me, or how He sees you. In God's eyes, we are His masterpiece. We are a "chosen people" (1 Peter 2:9), and He has a plan for us (Jeremiah 29:11).

As I watch God working out His plan, I can't help but think that He has a sense of humor. He seems to choose some of the most unlikely people for His work! The disciples were twelve ordinary men: fishermen, tax collectors, political zealots, and yet He chose them to take His message to the world. How about a young girl named Mary, who was chosen to be the mother to Jesus? Or Joseph, a small town carpenter? Or you and me?

If you had told me years ago that I would be working in a Christian school and church, I probably would have laughed. Yes, I was a Christian, but I did not go to school to be a church worker. I studied in medicine and business. I worked in hospitals. I read my Bible, but I was by no means a Biblical scholar. It would make no sense for God to ask me to serve in a church. I would be woefully inadequate for the job.

But you've probably heard it before: God does not call the equipped: He equips those He calls. God called me to step out of my comfort zone and follow Him: to be His disciple and to work in a church. It has been life changing for me.

You may not be in a place where your job or life has placed you in a position of Christian leadership, but you are still called to be a Christian leader in your life, right where you are. You have the ability to show Jesus to others every day, just by the way that you live. You don't need any special skills: He will give you what you need. God has chosen you, and He will equip you. What is He calling you to do?

If you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?" Then Esther sent this reply to Mordecai: "Go, gather together all the Jews who are in Susa, and fast for me. Do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. I and my attendants will fast as you do. When this is done, I will go to the king, even though it is against the law. And if I perish, I perish." Esther 4

The story of Esther fits well into our world where physical appearance is a constant source of peer pressure and frequently a topic on social media. Esther becomes the favored wife of King Xerxes because of her appearance. Haman, the highest of the nobles in the court of King Xerxes, persuades Xerxes to kill all of the Jews.

"Dispatches were sent by couriers to all the king's provinces with the order to destroy, kill and annihilate all the Jews."

Esther is a Jew! This was her critical moment. Maybe she had become the queen, "for such a time as this." She could plead for the King to reverse this order. It was against the law to go before him uninvited, so it was possible that she could lose her life. That's when she utters the critical words, "If I perish, I perish."

In our Rite of Confirmation we ask, "Do you intend to remain true to your confession of faith and suffer all, even death if necessary, rather than fall away from your faith?" With our answer, "I do so intend, with the help of God," Esther's words become our words!

How can you use your various positions as parent, coach, team member, neighbor, to always be alert to opportunities to love, support and help people God places in your life?

Maybe there is someone in your life who you could bless this Christmas. Maybe there is a family member or friend who doesn't believe in Jesus at this moment in their life. Maybe God has placed you in their life "for such a time as this." Christmas time opens doors for us to share what Christmas truly means to us. You don't have to be a beauty queen to "be the church." You just have to be you and be open to the Holy Spirit moving in your life.

Lord, keep my eyes and ears open to the people you have placed in my life. Make me bold to respond when you create opportunities for me to love people and help them to see Jesus this Christmas. Holy Spirit, use the best of me this Christmas so people see Jesus in me.

In the verse above from the book of Joel, even the farmers become mighty warriors. Now, let me tell you: I know some farmers who are among the strongest people I know, but they aren't trained to fight. But, God's math has always been $YOU + JESUS = MORE THAN ENOUGH$. Dusty isn't trained to be a psychotherapist, but his online smile wields the power to heal depression, anxiety, and sadness. Just what we need right now!

The Lord is a Warrior and is mighty in battle (Exodus 15:3). From heaven to earth to the cross to an empty tomb, to the Holy Spirit inside of us.

On this side of heaven, there will always be battles. Some might wield

swords, some might wield sadness. In **all** your battles, God invites the weak to say "I am a warrior", and empowers them to not only be conquerors but to celebrate the victory with your brothers and sisters in Christ!

When you point your children to Jesus during the mundane moments, you are helping them build a relationship with Him and investing in a faith that will last them a lifetime.

So, how will you honor and worship and thank God for Jesus this Christmas? What gifts do you have to offer God?

In the Christmas carol, the little drummer boy played his drum for Jesus. The shepherds rejoiced and told people what they had seen and heard. When I think about everything that went into those Maji seeing a star, trying to figure out what it meant, coming to the hypothesis that maybe this was “the star” that foretold the birth of a great king of the Jews, and organizing a trip to bring gifts. It is an incredible story and it has an incredible ending. “When they saw the star, they were overjoyed.” They bowed down and worshiped him. And they presented some amazing gifts.

What gift will you give this Christmas? It is a question worth pondering. Remember, the real story of Christmas isn’t about you, or the gifts you give. Christmas is about God, and His incredible love for you by coming into this messy, sinful, world to save you and to forgive you. The incredible Good News of Christmas is **you** get **the** gift.

God places a baby in your arms. God became human so you could see him, hear him, and come to believe in the depth of His love for you. God flips the whole “Christmas gift giving thing” upside down. He has a way of doing that!

Fear can also be exhausting. It can rob us of joy, damage relationships, and mess with our ability to sleep. But, fear can be a spiritual thing that challenges what we believe about people, who we can or should not trust, and what we believe about God.

So, what are you afraid of?

In the Christmas story the words are repeated, "Do not be afraid." When God comes, he doesn't want us to be afraid. In fact, he goes out of His way to start by telling us, "Do not be afraid." When God comes, it is not as a superhero blazing through the sky. He comes as a baby born to humble parents, lying in a manger.

God can be scary. Some people see him as a righteous judge who comes to "smite people" who disobey. But take a good look at the way God comes into the world to save it. He fulfills promises. He becomes human so we can see and hear and touch him. Rather than power up and demand allegiance, he teaches and heals and comforts and cares about individual people. He faces the ugliness of sin and is tortured, crucified, and abandoned. But he's not afraid.

Instead he says, "Father, forgive them." And, "It is finished." His message was, "I have come to forgive you so that nothing can separate you from God's love."

Our fears are sometimes real, sometimes imagined, some make perfect sense based on our life experiences, and some are irrational. But the fact is that our fears impact our lives.

God says, "Don't be afraid of me. Come to me!" God says, "I will put my Spirit in you. He is the Counselor, the Comforter and the power of God at work within you. Facing our fears sometimes requires owning them and seeking help. In the quiet of a stable, in the small town of Bethlehem, God came to earth to whisper in your ear, "Don't be afraid, I've got this. 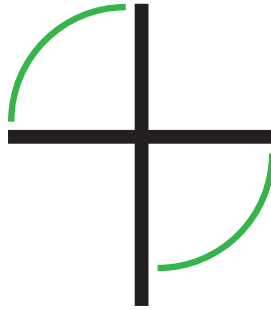
Pray for the people God places in your life.
